# NOTES FROM THE DUGGAN COMMUNITY GARDEN

Now that gardening season is here we would like to advise members of our community about some of the invasive plants that can be found growing in our neighborhood. If, as individuals and homeowners, we can eliminate these plants from our yards, we are taking small steps to better our community.

An **invasive species** is an organism (plant, animal, fungus, or bacterium) that is not native to the region, and can have a negative impact on our environment and economy. Not all introduced (or non-native) species are invasive. Invasive species are considered one of the greatest threats to our biodiversity after habitat loss. A noxious invasive species causes havoc to the agriculture industry and is often toxic to humans and animals.

The two plants described below were brought to Alberta for ornamental or medicinal purposes, but are now considered noxious or invasive.

**Common Tansy**: Scientific name (*Tanacetum vulgare*)

Originally brought to Alberta for medicinal and ornamental purpose

Now designated in the province as: **NOXIOUS** (as it can kill cattle due to the alkaloids present in this plant).

This is a perennial (comes back every year) species that belongs to the family Asteraceae (sunflower family)

**Leaves**: Arranged alternately on the stem and are highly divided. There are many leaflets on a single stem. The leaves and flower have a characteristic smell of camphor and rosemary mixed together.


**Flower**: Yellow in color and borne as a cluster at the top of the stem. The flower looks like a yellow button.

**Fruits:** The seeds are small, dry, one-seeded fruit that do not split open at maturity (known as achenes).

**Interesting facts about the plant**: Like most introduced species, this one was brought in from Europe and a embalming agent. It can kill livestock by contaminating hay stacks. The roots spread forming new plants.

How to eliminate it from our yards: The best way to eliminate tansy is to pull the plant using gloves. Make sure to pull the roots to prevent spreading. Recognizing the plant at early stage and removing is best.





# NOTES FROM THE DUGGAN COMMUNITY GARDEN



**Yellow Clematis**: Scientific name (*Clematis tangutica*).

Brought to Alberta for ornamental purposes

Designated in the province as: NOXIOUS. This plant escaped from British Columbia gardens and has spread to Alberta and Manitoba.

This is a perennial (comes back every year) species that belongs to the family Ranunculaceae (buttercup family).

It is a vine (climbs and needs support). After the first few years the stems become woody and difficult to remove.

**Leaves**: The leaves are arranged alternately on the stem divided into 3-5 leaflets (leaf is broken into small units).



**Fruits:** The fruit is a small seed attached by a silk thread. This helps in dispersal by wind.

**Interesting fact about the plant**: This species is native to the mountain regions of India and China and for this reason it can thrive in our environment. There is similar native Alberta species common to the Bow Valley known as common blue clematis (*Clematis occidentalis*).

**How to eliminate it from our yards**: The best way to eliminate the yellow clematis is to pull the plant. Once you recognize the plant make sure to pull it and bag it for disposal. Do not let the stems get woody.

We are happy to report that the girls came home with a gold medal as U12 Girls Tier 4 Provincial Champions! Congratulations to our U12 girls and their dedicated coaches – what an amazing accomplishment!

- 1 Edmonton Public School District Trustee for each of the 9 wards

Candidates do not become official until Nomination Day: **Monday September 18, 2017** View who has filed Notice of Intent to run for election.

Edmonton's city council is responsible for roads, bike routes, transit, LRT, and sidewalks.

Edmonton's Public and Catholic School Districts oversee the operation of schools across the city and the implementation of programming and curriculum for students.

Will you go to a recreation centre to swim, workout or play a team sport? Will you take a walk in a park or off-leash area?

City council makes decisions about where and when recreation and attractions will be built, and how parks and open spaces are managed. They also oversee the price for these amenities.

If you said "Yes" to any of these things, then you should vote!

# Who can Vote in the 2017 Edmonton Election

You may vote in the 2017 Edmonton Election if you:

- are at least 18 years old,
- · are a Canadian citizen,
- have lived in Alberta since April 16, 2017,
- · are currently living in Edmonton, and
- you live in the ward where you vote on election day.

To vote, you must present a piece of authorized (acceptable) identification with your name and current residential address.

Examples of authorized identification:

- Alberta Driver's Licence or vehicle insurance certificate
- Alberta Identification Card
- bank statement, credit card statement, personal cheque or utility bill
- pension statement
- lease or mortgage statement
- tax assessment notice
- correspondence from a post-secondary school

**NOTE:** Passports, work, and student ID are not accepted as authorized identification.

# HELP KEEP WILDLIFE WILD

# CO-EXISTING WITH COYOTES IN AN URBAN ENVIRONMENT

Coyotes are important in maintaining our urban ecosystem. They eat pests such as mice, small rabbits and

grasshoppers. But they can also cause problems when they become unafraid of human interaction.

Coyotes are extremely adaptable in habitat and diet. Because of this, they are comfortable in urban environments where they benefit from food sources and a lack of predators. As our city expands into wildlife habitat, coyotes are growing accustomed to food sources in residential areas such as bird feeders, garbage, compost piles and accessible pet food.

Edmontonians are reminded to respect urban wildlife and refrain from making food sources available. **Please do not:** 



- Feed coyotes
- Leave garbage out
- Leave fallen fruit from trees or bird seed spilled from feeders on the ground
- Feed pets outside
- Walk your dog off-leash in areas frequented by coyotes
- Leave small dogs in the yard unattended for long periods of time
- Let cats outside
- Provide shelter. Seal any holes under your steps or patio and prune overgrown shrubs or trees that could shelter a den.

If you come across a coyote and feel threatened:

- Respond assertively by making yourself appear large (wave arms overhead, hold big objects)
- Throw rocks, sticks or other objects to scare it away
- Carry a whistle and dog spray in areas highly frequented by coyotes
- Shout in a deep voice and maintain eye contact
- Do not turn away or run. This may trigger a natural predator/prey instinct and encourage the coyote to chase you
- If the covote approaches, back away slowly and move toward buildings or human activity

Only report a coyote sighting if the coyote has followed, chased or attacked someone or a pet; the coyote is acting aggressively; or the coyote looks sick. To report an incident or problem coyote, call:

#### I'M AN OUTDOOR CAT!



Often these cats end up at <u>Animal Care & Control Centre</u> as it is difficult to know if they are lost or not. **Identifying your cat as an outdoor animal** will help concerned citizens determine if they require assistance.




