I am always interested from hearing from you. Please send any notices, articles or advertisements to the email address below by the 15th of the month.



WHEN TO TAKE THAT STRAY CAT TO THE ACCC



Cats can roam on public property in Edmonton, but sometimes you'll see one that looks like it needs some help. Here's how to tell if you should call the Animal Care & Control Centre (ACCC):

- Owned outdoor cats are comfortable in their surroundings, look healthy and tend to approach humans. Only bring them to ACCC if they're a nuisance or injured.
- Owned indoor cats are scared and try to hide. They'll lose weight and their coats become dull and matted. If you can't find the owners, bring them to the ACCC.
- Feral cats are born in the wild, live in colonies, are active at night and fear humans. Don't interact with adult feral cats, but you can bring kittens that are comfortably walking to the ACCC.

Remember that if you feed and shelter outdoor cats, you'll encourage more cats on your property and larger feral cat populations. <u>Check our site</u> or call 311 if you need more help.

- Attends monthly community league meetings


SOCIAL AND EVENTS DIRECTOR (1-3 HOURS PER MONTH)



Emergency Medical Services



Window & Balcony Safety



With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often overlooked hazard in the home – access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and screens

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them:
- Keep drapery cords out of childrens' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard;
- Remember, screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not children in.

Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing;
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.

Further prevention tips

- Toddlers & preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window, or balcony, but it may happen at any age;
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies:
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches);
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly, so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.
- Consider purchasing a portable air conditioner, which will enable windows to stay closed & secure.


